



Red Wine Mountains caribou herd


Calving locations 1984






Year	Recruitment (calves: 100 ♀)	Survival of adult ?	Population growth





Forestry cuts 20 years earlier



The conservation of woodland caribou

The biological

- o Caribou depend on forest habitat condition
 - o Populations with high levels of disturbance face higher risk of extinction
- o Caribou conservation must be done on broad scales
 - o Effective habitat loss beyond developments 1 km to 5 km
 - o Population ranges 1000s of square kilometres
 - o Time delay between disturbance and caribou decline 2 decades
 - o Recovery of forests after fire half-century

The conservation of woodland caribou

The conceptual

- We are prisoners of perspective
- Vast spaces
 - O Beyond parcel perceptions of habitat
 - Whole landscapes and regions



- Long timeframes
 - Beyond multi-year plans and individual careers
 - A century plan for the boreal forest
